

## LODGE 306 CARTWHEEL-A-THON




When they have all twirled and rolled themselves silly, we then play games, have a visit from Santa and eat pizza.





#### 8. Old Business

#### a. Review of Sokolfest

There was a nice size audience for the seating area

The cleanliness of Convention Center was appreciated

The Open Ceremonies were well done – the rain & traffic couldn't be helped The competition and Slet venues were excellent, all in one place with the hotel connected; the atmosphere was impressive

ASO participants had many positive comments; felt everything was really well done Thanks to those districts & lodges who contributed money to the Slet

If a list is provided to Brandi Kovac, she will send a thank you letter to anyone who helped with Sokolfest. Bea Walko has sent letters to the participating organizations

Things to consider for improvement

The bowling venue couldn't keep up with the food requests on Friday night – need to make better arrangements

Provide a better list of food establishments – many closed early or didn't open early enough

Decide which is the final answer, the cal video or the text. Bryan Pracko and Stephen Banjak have volunteered to rewrite the cals in proper text if help is needed in the future

The awards area for men's awards should be the same as the women's If the Balance Beam event is being timed it should be announced in advance There should be more distinguishing of places in competitions – perhaps different colored ribbons for 1-3

Ties should be announced – not broken – or at least explain how they are broken Look for other ways to acknowledge winners if there is not a victory dance Submit ideas for rule changes before the next meeting

Address problems associated with hotel reservations

The Slovaks need a notarized letter to send to the Slovak Sokol a year prior to the event. They were poised to bring 30-40 people and perform a special number but never received the letter, so Stephen Banjak sent one at a very late date and only a few attended.

There should not be a tribute to deceased Sokols at the Slet since it is a celebration; several lodges expressed their disapproval since there were many deserving deceased Sokols. They should be remembered in the Slet program book.

The Slovak Catholic numbers were too long, with too few participants; guest organizations should follow our special number guidelines.

#### b. World Federation Meeting

Report was previously given by Sister Walko.

#### c. STAR Camp Report

Brandi Kovac reported that week one had 30 participants, week two had 45 and week three had 32. She felt that more Sokol USA members attended as a direct result of the subsidy from the Supreme Lodge.

#### d. National Camp Report

A National Camp report prepared by Lori Laznowski was read. Stephen Banjak expressed the need to pick up the kids at the same location as the drop off, Sokol Woodlands, not Manhattan since it is hard for someone so unfamiliar with the city. He also felt we needed to address liability issues pertaining not only to the trip to Manhattan, but also to other activities such as the canoe trip

It was suggested that we hold a "Sponsor a kid at camp" drive and encourage the inactive lodges to pay for a week of camp for a deserving young member.

Chuck Kalat added that ASO has another summer camp – the traveling weekend camp. It is designed for kids ages 7-14. A unit or district hosts it and the charge is \$35 per kid paid to ASO to cover the staff. It is not a gymnastics camp; it is more

like the National Camp. A minimum of 25 kids is required. The unit who hosts it charges \$65 per camper to cover costs and pay for T-shirts that everyone receives. It's a young staff, many teach at the National Camp and Tom Pager in charge of staff. If Sokol USA is interested in this camp they should let ASO know.

#### e. Kurz Report

A national Kurz run by ASO and hosted by Cleveland attracted just over 40 participants. An instructor's school is being planned for 2008.

#### f. YES! Council

Chris Yatchyshyn reported that the YES Council was not very active this year, but several members were present at the Slet. They assisted at the Opening Ceremonies and the Celebration Dance. She added that the original members are getting older. Two have been married and others are now finished with college and working. The group has also expressed their disappointment regarding the lack of change and progress in the organization.

Chuck Kalat added that the ASO New Wing will again host their winter Slet.

#### g. Code of Conduct

The Code of Conduct has been reviewed by Attorney Steve Tomko. He stated it is a "fluid document," and can be updated as needed.
