



WINTER WALKING

It is that time of year when we need to start thinking about walking indoors. When the temperature dips below freezing, we need to know where to go and walk inside. Perhaps we can go to the local mall, high school or a community center. The great thing about walking inside is that the temperature is always the same, it is level walking and we have the opportunity to meet new people. Plus, we can change our walking habits by incorporating stairs and speed of walking.

If you choose to continue to walk outside, you need to make sure you are prepared for the weather.

You should make sure you are wearing layers of clothing. So, if you get hot or overheated, you will be able to take off a layer. Do not forget your hat or mittens.

Make sure you take care of your feet. You can do this by ensuring you are wearing socks with waterproof shoes.

When starting out on your first couple of walks, make sure they are shorter ones to determine if you are properly dressed.

Some other good advice is to walk in the sun with the wind at your back and try to walk on a clean dry area.

11 BLOCKS A DAY

Walking may help maintain memory and cognitive function for years, a study published online found.

The research, in the Journal of Neurology, is based on a study of 299 men and women, average age 78, who were followed for nine years. The study participants were asked about their physical activity, which was calculated as the number of blocks walked per week (walking was the most common exercise). Study subjects walked from zero to 300 blocks a week. High resolution brain scans were done on the participants nine years after the beginning of the study.

The more the participants walked at the beginning of the study, the greater their brain volume was nine years later. This was still the case after researchers controlled for a number of factors, including age, sex, body mass index and education.

It took 72 blocks of walking per week to show improvement. Walking more did not further increase brain volume. All participants were deemed cognitively normal at the beginning of the study. Forty percent developed cognitive impairment or dementia four years in. Those who walked the most reduced their risk of acquiring memory loss by half.

Lead author Kirk Erickson of the University of Pittsburgh said in a new release: "If regular exercise in midlife could improve brain health and improve thinking and memory in later life, it would be one more reason to make regular exercise in people of all ages a public health imperative."




