


## WALKING CLUB STRUTS THEIR STUFF!

What do you do when you get bumped out of Hershey by Billy Joel? You head to the Cleveland area where you know you can pull off a successful Slet!

For those of you who may not know, the original location of Sokolfest XXVI was Hershey, Pa. After making numerous inquiries about venues, rooms and social activities, our site team of Katrina Coleman and Charity Ruhl decided that the Hershey Lodge and Conference Center would be a great location for a Sokol USA Slet - and the directors were in complete agreement.
